
KENTUCKY IN THE NEWS

The recent election has placed the geographic principles at the center of the national conversation. The cartogram above is used to show voting patterns based on population of a county in 2010 rather than its physical size. Geographers study demographics (population) characteristics to understand economic and social issues. These characteristics include gender, age, race, migration, religion, education, income and many other variables. The US Census provides insights into the change of demographics over time. Different regions and states in the US have seen change, some more than others. Political issues related to demographic change can have short-term consequences and benefits at the local, regional, and national level over time. Understanding geographic principles can help explain many issues in today's globalizing world.

Today is national <u>GIS day</u> as well as <u>Geography Awareness Week</u>.
